19	<u>PARTIES</u>			
20	1. Dr. Michael Marion, Jr. ("Complainant") brings this Statement of Issues solely in his			
21	official capacity as the Chief of the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education, Department of			
22	Consumer Affairs.			
23	2. On or about June 8, 2015, the Bureau	for Private Postsecondary Education ("Bureau")		
24	received an Application for Approval to Operate an Institution Non-Accredited from Respondent			
25	CodingDojo, Inc., also known as Coding Dojo ("Respondent"), a California corporation.			
26	Between June 22, 2015 and May 25, 2017, the Bureau and Respondent exchanged			
27	correspondence regarding Respondent's application.			
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6. Section 94886 provides:

"Except as exempted in Article 4 (commencing with Section 94874) or in compliance with the transition provisions in Article 2 (commencing with Section 94802), a person shall not open, conduct, or do business as a private postsecondary educational institution in this state without obtaining an approval to operate under this chapter."

7. Section 94887 provides:

"An approval to operate shall be granted only after an applicant has presented sufficient evidence to the bureau, and the bureau has independently verified the information provided by the applicant through site visits or other methods deemed appropriate by the bureau, that the applicant has the capacity to satisfy the minimum operating standards. The bureau shall deny an application for an approval to operate if the application does not satisfy those standards."

STATUTORY AND REGULATORY PROVISIONS

8. **Section 94817.5** provides:

"'Approved to operate' or 'approved' means that an institution has received authorization pursuant to this chapter to offer to the public and to provide postsecondary educational programs."

9. Section 94837 provides:

"Educational program' means a planned sequence composed of a single course or module, or set of related courses or modules, that provides education, training, skills, or experience, or a combination of these."

10. Section 94841 provides:

"Faculty' means the instructional staff of an institution, whether these persons are employees or independent contractors."

11. Section 94868 provides:

"'To offer to the public' means to advertise, publicize, solicit, or recruit."

12. Section 94869 provides:

"To operate' means to establish, keep, or maintain any facility or location in this state where, or from which, or through which, postsecondary educational programs are provided."

13.	Section	94901	provides:

- "(a) An institution's recruiters shall be employees.
- "(b)(1) An institution shall issue identification to each recruiter identifying the recruiter and the institution.
 - "(2) The recruiter shall have the issued identification with him or her while recruiting."
 - 14. Section 94909, subdivision (a)(16) provides:
- "(a) Except as provided in subdivision (d), prior to enrollment, an institution shall provide a prospective student, either in writing or electronically, with a school catalog containing, at a minimum, all of the following:

. . .

- "(16) A statement specifying whether the institution, or any of its degree programs, are accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the United States Department of Education. If the institution is unaccredited and offers an associate, baccalaureate, master's, or doctoral degree, or is accredited and offers an unaccredited program for an associate, baccalaureate, master's, or doctoral degree, the statement shall disclose the known limitations of the degree program, including, but not limited to, all of the following:
- "(A) Whether a graduate of the degree program will be eligible to sit for the applicable licensure exam in California and other states or become certified or registered as required for the applicable profession, occupation, trade, or career field in California.
- "(B) A degree program that is unaccredited or a degree from an unaccredited institution is not recognized for some employment positions, including, but not limited to, positions with the State of California.
- "(C) That a student enrolled in an unaccredited institution is not eligible for federal financial aid programs."
 - 15. California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 70000, subdivision (c) provides:
- "(c) "Chief academic officer" means the person primarily responsible for the administration of an institution's academic affairs including the supervision of faculty, development of

20. California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71405 provides:

- "(a) If, after the submission of an application but prior to the Bureau's decision to approve or deny an approval to operate, there is any material change in circumstances affecting any information contained in the application or submitted by the institution in support of the application, the institution shall immediately inform the Bureau in writing.
- "(b) For the purposes of this section, a change in circumstance is "material" if, without the inclusion of the new or different information into the application, the information contained in or the supporting documentation to the application would be false, misleading, or incomplete."

21. California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71710 provides:

"In order to meet its mission and objectives, the educational program defined in section 94837 of the Code shall be comprised of a curriculum that includes:

- "(a) those subject areas that are necessary for a student to achieve the educational objectives of the educational program in which the student is enrolled;
- "(b) subject areas and courses or modules that are presented in a logically organized manner or sequence to students;
- "(c) course or module materials that are designed or organized by duly qualified faculty.

 For each course or module, each student shall be provided with a syllabus or course outline that contains:
 - "(1) a short, descriptive title of the educational program;
 - "(2) a statement of educational objectives;
 - "(3) length of the educational program;
 - "(4) sequence and frequency of lessons or class sessions;
 - "(5) complete citations of textbooks and other required written materials;
- "(6) sequential and detailed outline of subject matter to be addressed or a list of skills to be learned and how those skills are to be measured;
 - "(7) instructional mode or methods.
- "(d) if degree granting, require research of an appropriate degree that utilizes a library and other learning resources;

"(e) specific learning outcomes tied to the sequence of the presentation of the material to
neasure the students' learning of the material; and

- "(f) evaluation by duly qualified faculty of those learning outcomes."
- 22. California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71715, subdivisions (a) and (b) provide:
 - "(a) Instruction shall be the central focus of the resources and services of the institution.
- "(b) The institution shall document that the instruction offered leads to the achievement of the learning objectives of each course.

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23. California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71720 provides:

- "(a) An Educational Program Leading to a Degree.
- "(1) An institution offering an educational program that leads to a degree shall employ duly qualified faculty sufficient in number to provide the instruction, student advisement, and learning outcomes evaluation necessary for the institution to document its achievement of its stated mission and objectives, and for students to achieve the specific learning objectives of each course offered;
- "(2) Each institution shall develop and implement written policies and procedures providing for the participation by duly qualified faculty in the conducting of research, development of curricula, academic planning, enforcement of standards of academic quality, pursuit of academic matters related to the institution's mission and objectives, establishment of criteria for contracting with new faculty, and evaluation of faculty credentials;
- "(3) In determining the number of faculty sufficient to satisfy subdivision (a)(1) of this section and to implement the policies established pursuant to subdivision (a)(2) of this section, the institution shall base its faculty requirements on all of the following factors:
 - "(A) The educational level and number of students;
- "(B) The number of hours needed for direct interaction between students and faculty per course, quarter, semester, or other term;

- "(C) The number of hours needed to be spent on evaluating written materials prepared by students, such as distance education, papers, and examinations, per course, quarter, semester, or other term;
 - "(D) The number of group meetings per course, quarter, semester, or other term;
- "(E) The faculty duties established by the institution as required under subdivision (a)(2) of this section; and
- "(F) The number of hours per week or units per term considered full-time for faculty in the institution.
- "(4) The faculty shall have sufficient expertise to support the institution's awarding of a degree identifying a specialty or major field of emphasis, demonstrated by, at a minimum:
 - "(A) That the person possesses one of the following:
- "1. a degree from: an institution approved by the Bureau or previously approved by a predecessor agency of the Bureau; or an accredited institution in the United States or Canada; or other state approved institution that documents that the institution at which the faculty member earned his or her degree is equivalent to an institution that is approved by the Bureau; or an institution outside the United States or Canada and in addition provides a comprehensive evaluation of the degree performed by a foreign credential evaluation service that is a member of the National Association of Credential Evaluation Services (NACES).
 - "2. a credential generally recognized in the field of instruction.
- "(B) The degree, professional license, or credential possessed by the person shall be at least equivalent to the level of instruction being taught or evaluated;
- "(5) The institution's faculty as a whole shall possess a diverse educational background which shall be demonstrated in part by earned degrees from a variety of colleges and universities or by credentials generally recognized in the field of instruction;
- "(6) When contracting for educational services, the institution shall maintain control of, and responsibility for, all academic matters, and shall assure that the instruction and faculty satisfy the standards established by the Act and this chapter;

- "(7) The institution shall not employ or continue to employ any faculty who were adjudicated in a judicial or administrative proceeding as having violated any provision of the Act or this chapter or as having committed any act that would constitute grounds for the denial of a license under Section 480 of the Business and Professions Code;
- "(8) Each institution shall have a written Academic Freedom Policy which describes the latitude the institution allows faculty in the classroom so faculty will not inadvertently violate the principles of academic freedom. These policies shall be made available to any person upon request. The institution shall not take adverse action based on a staff member's exercise of academic freedom consistent with the institution's policy; and
- "(9) The institution shall maintain records documenting that each faculty member is duly qualified and was qualified to perform the duties to which the faculty member was assigned, including providing instruction, evaluating learning outcomes, evaluating graduate dissertations, theses, and student projects, and participating on doctoral committees.
 - "(b) Instructors in an Educational Program Not Leading to a Degree.
- "(1) An institution shall employ instructors who possess the academic, experiential and professional qualifications to teach, including a minimum of three years of experience, education and training in current practices of the subject area they are teaching. If an instructor does not possess the required three years of experience, education and training in the subject area they are teaching, the institution shall document the qualifications the instructor possesses that are equivalent to the minimum qualifications.
- "(2) Each instructor shall maintain their knowledge by completing continuing education courses in his or her subject area, classroom management or other courses related to teaching.
- "(3) The institution shall not employ or continue to employ an instructor who was adjudicated in a judicial or administrative proceeding as having violated any provision of the Act or this chapter, or as having committed any act that would constitute grounds for the denial of a license under Section 480 of the Business and Professions Code."

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	c.	Respondent's application fails to include performance evaluation criteria for its
Chief Acac	lemic (Officer, Chief Executive Officer, and Chief Operating Officer. (Cal. Code of
Regs., title	5, § 7	1730, subd. (b)).

- d. Respondent has failed to demonstrate that its administrative staffing at each branch location will reflect the purposes, size, and educational operations at that location and at any satellite location for which the branch has administrative responsibilities. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71730, subds. (c) and (d)).
- e. Respondent's application fails to clearly identify the responsibilities and duties of its faculty members, specifically the positions of "Instructors," "Teaching Assistants," and "Faculty Assistants." (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71140, subd. (b) and 71720).
- f. Respondent's job description for the "Instructor" position fails to include any of the qualifications required by law. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71140, subd. (b); 71250; and 71720, subd. (b)).
- g. Respondent's proposed faculty members E.B. and B.S. lack the academic, experiential and professional qualifications to teach. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71720, subd. (b)).
- h. Respondent's application does not demonstrate that Respondent employs proper recruitment practices. (Educ. Code § 94901).

THIRD CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION (Instruction)

(Educ. Code §§ 94837 and 94887; and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71210, subds. (c)(4) and (c)(6); 71220, subd. (c); 71405; 71710; 71715, subds. (a) and (b); 71720, subd. (b); and 71770, subd. (a))

- 29. Respondent's application is subject to denial because it fails to demonstrate that the instruction it proposes to offer meets minimum operating standards. (Educ. Code §§ 94837 and 94887; and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71210, subds. (c)(4) and (c)(6); 71220, subd. (c); 71405; 71710; 71715, subds. (a) and (b); 71720, subd. (b); and 71770, subd. (a)). In particular:
- a. Respondent's application offers instruction and degree descriptions for three programs: "Onsite Bootcamp," "Online Bootcampt," and "Front End Bootcamp." But Respondent's website also offers three additional programs, not referenced in its application:

"Dev Accelerator," "Corporate Training," and "Alexa Skills Workshop." As a result, it is unclear how many educational programs Respondent intends to offer. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71405 and 71710).

- b. Respondent's application fails to offer specific written standards for student admissions for each educational program. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71770, subd. (a)).
- c. Respondent's application refers to the presence of "Faculty Assistants" in the classroom, without reference to how "Faculty Assistants" will contribute to instruction. Accordingly, Respondent's application fails to list the components of instruction offered, document that the instruction offered leads to the achievement of the learning objectives of each course, or otherwise demonstrate that instruction will be the central focus of Respondent's resources and services. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71210, subd. (c)(4) and 71715, subds. (a) and (b)).
- d. Respondent's application fails to provide the graduation requirements for each educational program, list the subject areas that are necessary for a student to achieve the educational objectives of the educational program in which the student is enrolled, document that the instruction offered leads to the achievement of the learning objectives of each course, or otherwise demonstrate that instruction will be the central focus of Respondent's resources and services. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71210, subd. (c)(6); 71710, subd. (a); and 71715, subds. (a) and (b)).
- e. Respondent's application fails to demonstrate its educational program is comprised of a curriculum that includes those subject areas that are necessary for a student to achieve the educational objectives of the educational program in which the student is enrolled. (Educ. Code § 94837 and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71710, subd. (a)).
- f. Respondent's application fails to describe the qualifications of the faculty needed to teach the educational program or confirm that its proposed instructors possess the academic, experiential and professional qualifications to teach. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71220, subd. (c); 71710, subd. (f); and 71720, subd. (b)).

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- Respondent's proposed catalog fails to contain procedures for student access to library and other learning resources. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71810, subd. (b)(10)).
- Respondent's proposed catalog fails to contain language proficiency information. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71810, subd. (b)(4)).
- Respondent's proposed catalog fails to state whether any of its programs are accredited by any accrediting agency recognized by the United States Department of Education.
- Respondent's proposed catalog fails to state, for its distance education program. the approximate number of days that will elapse between the institution's receipt of student lessons, projects, or dissertations and the institution's mailing of its response or evaluation. (Cal.

DISCIPLINARY CONSIDERATIONS

To determine whether to approve or deny Respondent's Application for Approval to Operate for an Institution Non-Accredited, Complainant alleges that on or about April 27, 2015, in a prior action, the Bureau issued Citation Number 1415052 to Respondent. That citation was amended via a Modified Citation on or about June 17, 2016. The Modified Citation alleged a cause for citation for Operating Without Approval (Educ. Code §§ 94817.5, 94868, 94869, 94885, and 94886), which is also a basis for denying Respondent's application alleged in this Statement of Issues; ordered Respondent "to cease to operate [its private postsecondary education institution] immediately until such time that an approval to operate has been obtained from the Bureau"; and imposed an administrative fine of \$25,000.00. That Citation is now final and ///// ///// /////

PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters alleged in this Statement of Issues and that, following the hearing, the Director of the Department of Consumer Affairs issue a decision:

- Denying Respondent's Application for Approval to Operate for an Institution Non-Accredited; and
 - 2. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
