20	<u>PARTIES</u>						
21	1. Joanne Wenzel (Complainant) brings this Statement of Issues solely in her official						
22	capacity as the Chief of the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education, Department of						
23	Consumer Affairs (Bureau).						
24	2. On or about December 20, 2013, the Bureau received an application for Approval to						
25	Operate an Institution Non Accredited from Hancock College of Arts & Sciences (Respondent).						
26	On or about December 13, 2013, Ki Sun Ham, 100% owner of Respondent, certified under						
27	penalty of perjury to the truthfulness of all statements, answers, and representations in the						
28	application. An incomplete application letter wa	s sent to Respondent on December 23, 2013. A					

- (7) That, upon satisfactory completion of an educational program, the institution gives students a document signifying the degree or diploma awarded.
  - (8) Adequate records and standard transcripts are maintained and are available to students.
- (9) The institution is maintained and operated in compliance with this chapter and all other applicable ordinances and laws.
- (b) Except as provided in Section 94855.1, an institution offering a degree must satisfy one of the following requirements:
- (i) Accreditation by an accrediting agency recognized by the United States Department of Education, with the scope of that accreditation covering the offering of at least one degree program by the institution.
- (ii) An accreditation plan, approved by the bureau, for the institution to become fully accredited within five years of the bureau's issuance of a provisional approval to operate to the institution. The provisional approval to operate to an unaccredited degree-offering institution shall be in compliance with Section 94885.5."
  - 6. Education Code section 94886 states:

"Except as exempted in Article 4 (commencing with Section 94874) or in compliance with the transition provisions in Article 2 (commencing with Section 94802), a person shall not open, conduct, or do business as a private postsecondary educational institution in this state without obtaining an approval to operate under this chapter."

7. Education Code section 94887:

"An approval to operate shall be granted only after an applicant has presented sufficient evidence to the bureau, and the bureau has independently verified the information provided by the applicant through site visits or other methods deemed appropriate by the bureau, that the applicant has the capacity to satisfy the minimum operating standards. The bureau shall deny an application for an approval to operate if the application does not satisfy those standards."

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8.	Education	Code	section	94909	states:

"(a) Except as provided in subdivision (d), prior to enrollment, an institution shall provide a prospective student, either in writing or electronically, with a school catalog containing, at a minimum, all of the following:

(3) The following statements:

(A) 'Any questions a student may have regarding this catalog that have not been satisfactorily answered by the institution may be directed to the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education at (address), Sacramento, CA (ZIP Code), (Internet Web site address), (telephone and fax numbers).'

(5) A description of the programs offered and a description of the instruction provided in each of the courses offered by the institution, the requirements for completion of each program, including required courses, any final tests or examinations, any required internships or externships, and the total number of credit hours, clock hours, or other increments required for completion.

..."

#### REGULATORY PROVISIONS

- 9. California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71100 states:
- "(a) An applicant seeking approval to operate pursuant to Section 94886 of the Code, other than Approval to Operate by Accreditation pursuant to Section 94890(a)(1) of the Code, shall complete the "Application for Approval to Operate for an Institution Not Accredited," Form Application 94886 (rev. 2/10). An applicant seeking approval to operate by accreditation pursuant to Section 94890(a)(1) of the Code shall comply with section 71390.
- (b) An applicant shall submit the completed form, the information or documentation, required by this Article, the appropriate application fee as provided in Section 94930.5(a)(1) of the Code, and any appropriate annual fee as required by Article 1 of Chapter 5 of this Division, to the Bureau.

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measure the students' learning of the material; and

(f) evaluation by duly qualified faculty of those learning outcomes."

# FIRST CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

# (Incomplete Application)

12. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Education Code section 94887 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71220, subdivision (d), in that on or about December 20, 2013, Respondent submitted an incomplete application to the Bureau when it failed to provide the basis for its projection of the number of enrollments for the next three years. The Bureau requested the basis for the projections in a deficiency letter dated April 3, 2015. The institution failed to comply with the request. Respondent returned an Occupational Outlook Handbook publication, which is not the basis for projection of the number of enrollments for the next three years.

## SECOND CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

## (Deficient Instruction and Degrees Offered)

- 13. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Education Code section 94887 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71710, subdivision (b), and 71710, subdivisions (c)(4), (c)(5), (c)(6), (e) and (f) as follows:
- Respondent provided a course outline that totaled 245 hours for a Massage Therapy I course, and not 250 hours as stated by the institution in its syllabus. The course outline with the appropriate hours was requested by the Bureau in a deficiency letter dated April 3, 2015 and was not provided. (Violation of California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71710, subdivision (b));
- Respondent also failed to provide a complete course outline for a Massage Therapy I (b) course outline. The course outline was missing the sequence and frequency of lessons or class sessions, the citation for the Milady Massage Textbook, and the tests or exams for the course. The complete course outline was requested by the Bureau in a deficiency letter dated April 3, 2015 and was not provided. (Violation of California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71710, subdivisions (c)(4), (c)(5), (c)(6), (e) and (f).

## THIRD CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

#### (Deficient Catalog)

14. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Education Code sections 94887 and 94909, subdivision (3)(A)(5), in that Respondent failed to provide the required final tests or exams for the program descriptions as required to measure student learning outcomes in the school catalog.

#### PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged, and that following the hearing, the Director of the Department of Consumer Affairs issue a decision:

- Denying the application of Hancock College of Arts & Sciences, Kim Sun Ham as
   Owner, for an Approval to Operate an Institution Non Accredited;
  - 2. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
